

## **MLA citation style formats for some common types of sources:**

From MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers. 6th ed. Ref LB 2369 .G53 2003

### **Book:**

Author(s). Title of Book. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication.

Examples:

Henley, Patricia. The Hummingbird House. Denver: MacMurray, 1999.

Gillespie, Paula, and Neal Lerner. The Allyn and Bacon Guide to Peer Tutoring. Boston: Allyn, 2000.

### **Article in a magazine or newspaper:**

Author(s). "Title of Article." Title of Source Day Month Year: pages.

Example:

Poniewozik, James. "TV Makes a Too-Close Call." Time 20 Nov. 2000: 70-71.

### **Article in a scholarly journal:**

Author(s). "Title of Article." Title of Journal Vol (Year): pages.

Example:

Allen, Emily. "Staging Identity: Frances Burney's Allegory of Genre." Eighteenth Century Studies 31 (1998): 433-51.

### **Article retrieved online from a subscription database, such as Omnifile or Academic Search Premier:**

Author. "Title of Article." Publication Name Volume Number (if necessary) Publication Date: page number-page number. Database name. Service name. Library Name, City, State. Date of access <electronic address of the database>.

Example:

Kanevsky, Lannie and Tracey Keighley. "To Produce or not to Produce? Understanding Bordon and the Honor in Underachievement." Roepers Review 25.1 (2000): 20-28. Omnifile. Lane Lib., Savannah GA. 5 Nov. 2004.

### **JSTOR Entry Elements:**

Author(s). "Title of the Article." Title of the Periodical volume number.issue number (Date of publication): page numbers. Name of database. Name, city, and state abbreviation of library accessed. Date accessed.
